STRIKE

Campaign Cry of Democrats.

Party to Blame Republicans for Labor Troubles and Industrial Ruptures.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 27.—Information is gradually circulating through political headquarters in this city which tends to show that the Parker-Davis management is preparing to launch a campaign in which appeal for support will be made on the ground of industrial strikes, trusts and high prices. It is reported that clerks in the employ of the Democratic national committee are busily engaged collecting strike statistics and data relating to failures throughout the country. Inasmuch as strikes have been fomented and aggravated chiefly in the large cities, most of which are under Democratic control, the task of preaching calamity obviously will be an easy one.

For several weeks assurance has been given by Democratic leaders that the fight against exclusively in the "industrial centers," but information was received yesterday which points to a plan of campaign based upon strikes, high prices and general industrial disturbances, without regard to the particular causes in which they are due. It is also learned that many corporations favorable to the election of Parker have been approached without the suggestion that they "lay off" employees between now and election. The supposition that there is no member of the Republican national committee "big enough" to settle industrial disturbances such as may arise between now and November is assigned as another reason why it would be good politics to charge on strikes to the Republican administration.

In brief, the Democratic campaign promises to be a calamity performance, in which yellow journals will play a leading part in the large cities. Meanwhile, Democratic representatives are doing a land office business in newspaper clipping, strikes and business disturbances are being noted wherever found in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Montana, Nevada and the far west and an attempt will be made by the Democratic spellbinders to show that the country is in the throes of a great industrial uprising, and as the result of trust protection. In Illinois Chicago will furnish scores of strikes, which will be held up by Democratic spellbinders as harbingers of hard times.

SPEAKER CANNON

BACK FROM EAST.
"Uncle Joe" Cannon called at Republican national headquarters yesterday on his way to Danville. "Uncle Joe" is wearing a triple coat of tan and is in the best of health and spirits. He spent two weeks in Vermont and New Hampshire and will open the Republican campaign in Richmond, Ind., Sept. 1, speaking at Marion on the day following. Richmond is in Congressman Watson's district and "Uncle Joe" promised to give the Hoosier a "lift."

When asked about the general effect of labor disturbances upon the campaign Speaker Cannon said: "I can't see much in the labor situation to affect the election. All these strikes and labor disturbances are contests over something which exists—namely, profits."

"I'M THE MAN," SAYS M'CARREN

Brooklyn Leader Repudiates Downing's Domination in New York.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Senator Patrick J. McCarren declared emphatically today that he was the real head of the Democratic state executive committee and was just as much in charge of the campaign in Brooklyn as he was before Murphy's friend, Senator Downing, was placed on the committee. McCarren added some words of praise for Downing.

The cause of today's outburst from McCarren was Murphy's statement yesterday, in which he declared that Senator Downing would be entirely independent of McCarren and would be in charge of the conduct of the campaign in Brooklyn. Murphy added that if McCarren was chairman of the executive committee he was chairman in name only, a sort of political figurehead, as it were.

McCarren was seen at his desk at Democratic headquarters in Brooklyn today. He set his face hard when his attorney was called to the Murphy in the street and said: "Downing has not succeeded me as the power in the Democratic executive committee. I am chairman, in fact, with everything that the title implies. Downing will not have anything to say in regard to the management of the campaign at Brooklyn. Neither will he have anything to do with the distribution of campaign funds here."

Serious Charge Made

Princeton Man is Arrested for Alleged Incest.

PRINCETON, Ind., Aug. 27.—James Chance, proprietor of the restaurant at the Southern station, was arrested yesterday by Sheriff Holst on the charge of incest preferred by his 14-year-old daughter, Bessie.

The defendant is a married man and resides with his wife on North Hart Street. It is alleged that the unnatural crime took place at the home. The girl is an illegitimate daughter of Chance's and has been living with his family for about three years. She formerly resided with her grandmother near Rosmer, Pike county, her mother being dead.

The girl alleges that her father assaulted her five times and warned her not to say anything about it. She alleges the first assault took place while they were visiting the world's fair. The police had known of Chance's alleged crime for several days, and had been working on it. The officials say that this is not the first time that he has been mixed up in trouble with young girls, but that he had to leave Carol, Ill., once on the charge of assault.

Chance was arraigned before Justice Sprawl and waived preliminary hearing. He was bound over to the Circuit Court under bond for his appearance at the next term.
