### BIG CROWD CHEERS GOV. HUGHES ON RACING ISSUE

Grady and McCarron Assailed by Speakers at Meeting in Brooklyn.

New York, April 19.—A special avenue branch of the Y. M. C. A. in Brooklyn, was swamped this afternoon by the crowd which turned out to hear Gov. Hughes speak on the anti-race track gambling bills.

Only a few hundred of the men crowded into the hall, some of them roosting on the window sills. In the main reception room were 500 men. When the speakers were admitted, while a good-sized crowd gathered in the street unable to get entrance to the hall.

Hughes addressed the overflow briefly in the reception room, then went outside and got into a taxi and let him through to the hall. As he walked down the narrow lane many great racket, and for a time this Easter Sunday gathering lacked the atmosphere of a Sunday campaign meeting.

that, and it was not made up exclusively of Y. M. C. A. members. The mass meeting had been advertised widely, and Bedford Avenue itself and every other street admitted, regardless of race, creed or color.

Grady and McCarron were "lambasted" by the ministers who addressed the meeting, though speakers admitted that an attack on them was hopeless. Their advice was to see that the party's power was not used to defeat the votes held responsible for the defeat of these bills.

## DR. KUMMER TAKES FIRST PLACE IN THE SINGLES

Score of 642 Gives Him Big Lead Over Nearest Competitor—Vizard and Kastler Also Roll Well, Taking Second and Third Places Respectively—Tom O'Connell Is All-Around Champion.

Last evening's game brought the annual tournament of the Michigan State Bowlers to a close after a full week of pin-spilling, during which one world's record was made, and a number of excellent scores recorded.

Dr. Kummer, of Toledo, took first place in the singles with a score of 642, and was followed in the competition by twenty-one pins. Stuart and Weaver are high in the standing.

Wastler, of Toledo, was being approached by a number of the pins rolling on the final day.

In the women's team division, the Woodward's No. 2 team, with its world's record score of 1,829, finished in the tenth position, with a place in the All Stars, with 2,338, being second.

Jim Trent, who was picked to win the all-around championship, had his score in the doubles and foursomes far below the necessary score in the singles by one pin, rolling 30 when he needed 31 to be in the top. Tom O'Connell, accordingly, takes the prize.

Kastler took third place with 617. His start was a poor one, only 173 pins falling for the first 100 pins. In the second he hit his stride and got 212, while his final score was 210.

This leaves Walter Wray, who stood at the top of the column of the All Stars, with 1,916, in fourth place, with a score of 618. Widdis took seventh position on a total of 600, and was followed in the standing. His first game was 228, his second 202 and his third 207.

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Dr. Kummer's work was sensational yesterday. For the first two games it looked as though he had won the title, but in the second he beat this one and in the third he fell down badly, making but 174.

Vizard also was in fine form, and was followed in the competition by twenty-one pins. Stuart and Weaver are high in the standing.

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
