HITS SALOONISTS

Urges Exclusion From Societies  
of Church of Men Engaged  
in Liquor Traffic

New Haven, Conn., August 12.—Denunciation of the liquor traffic, an appeal for sanctification of rum and gin, and a plea for the prohibition of beer in Catholic parishes were the striking features of the convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence union today.

After the opening of the convention by the reading up of the resolutions had by Fr. Lambing, of Scituate, Pa., as chairman, the Rev. Fr. O'Connell, of New Britain, declared that "not in drunkenness and riotous living, but in the sanctification of the Catholic faith" victory would be won in the struggle against the taints of its critics. It was then that the Rev. Fr. O'Connell contended the claims for ultra orthodoxy which have been advanced by the ultra Catholics, and tried to substitute the beer modification of the prohibition law for the absolute prohibition of all alcoholic drinks.

**Opposes Certain Clubs.**

The union also declares its allegiance to the Catholic church, and adds:

"With all our souls we welcome the Catholic church to the prohibition fight. We are not for the ultra Fr. X. on modernism."

"We are not for the ultra Fr. X. on modernism," he said, "but Catholic pervasively that cannot be separated from the church should die. Let them not drag down the church."

The Catholic name in their green and white robes, the Catholic organizations which exclude alcohol and tobacco, the Catholicism which forbids the use of liquor at their meetings should not tolerate the presence of those who are not members of the church, and whose membership which despises the letter of the law, and whose actions have been made by their organization for the honor of the Catholic name.

**VOTE IN FAVOR OF STRIKE**

Lake Shore Machinists Object to Continuation of Piece Work.

Cleveland, August 12.—Following the desire for an expression from the machinists employed by the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railway Co. upon the advisability of striking if piece work is continued, the 300 men employed here voted today.

Four hundred and thirty-one votes of machinists were cast in favor of striking if piece work is continued. Likhart and other Lake Shore men who are employed on the Cleveland workmen's road made a similar showing. They will favor piece work if it is paid, but there is no discrimination.

The matter of striking usually will be referred to the union's executive committee, which will determine whether all piece work will be forfeited.
