Important changes in the relative positions of the batting kings in the major-league took place last week. The most significant was the great jump taken by Lajoie, who went ahead of Cobb despite the latter's increase in his average. Cobb bettered his record from .351 to .362, but Lajoie's jump was almost phenomenal. The average of the big Cleveland infielder last week was .370, two points less than Cobb's, but this week Lajoie's eight points in advance of the Detroit star.

In the National League Wagner made the biggest jump in the batting average, the same percentage that Magee is credited with. Wagner jumped nine points for the week. Of the other leading batters in the National League, Snodgrass took a big tumble last week, while Hoffman fell from .328 to .325.

Collins of the Athletics took a drop, falling from .317 to .301. Murphy of the same club lost three points and is credited with .297.
