## TRAIN LOADS

### OF GIFTS FOR

### THE SOLDIERS

PARIS, Dec. 22.—Christmas cheer  
is going forward to the men in the  
trenches today. The trains and vans  
that usually carry death dealing sup-  
plies or food for the men who are  
doing the killing were today filled  
with gifts. Long trains were loaded  
unusually to the front. Every soldier  
will receive a special Christmas  
dinner and some sort of a present,  
even if it has to be delivered in the  
fighting trench.

Paris, the joyous, will celebrate  
Christmas merrily, but without sad-  
ness. There will be no revelries.  
The authorities have banned all night  
Christmas eve celebrations in the  
restaurants. All must close at  
10 o'clock. The government wants  
no appearance of joyousness in cafes  
when men are offering their lives at  
the front.

Some of the great hotels where al-  
right revels formerly held away are  
now temporary hospitals and work  
rooms. The renowned Abbey is a  
show room where dolls dressed by  
poor midwives are exhibited.

Everywhere on the boulevards last  
night was an air of cheerfulness.  
The stores were gay, though custom-  
ers were less numerous.

Martial toys practically exclude all  
others. The favorite mechanical  
toys include British soldiers which  
march along with measured tread.  
Turcos charging with upraised bay-  
onet, and German infantrymen which  
collapse when shot by a toy  
Fakir behind tiny tables sell small  
cannon, lead soldiers, miniature  
text and other warlike toys. In the  
stores soldiers' kits and uniforms are  
displayed for the kiddies. The shop  
windows, almost without exception,  
suggest war. Most of them show  
battle fields.

Male dolls have now come into  
their own. Kiddie's imaginations

## CANNOT STOP EXECUTIONS BY MEXICANS

### UNITED STATES POWERLESS TO DO OTHER THAN TO SUGGEST TO CARRANZA AND GUTIER- REZ AS TO THE RULES OF CIV- ILIZED WARFARE.

(By United Press.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—The  
United States is powerless to prevent  
summary executions of political enemies  
by the various Mexican factional  
leaders. This is the reply understood  
today to have been made to several  
influential Mexicans who have ap-  
pealed to the state department to  
protect from their bloodthirsty at vari-  
ous Mexican cities. It can insist on  
protection for Americans and other  
foreigners, but can only use moral  
suasion where the persons in dan-  
ger are Mexicans.

It has tried to use its good offices  
with both Carranza and Gutierrez to  
have them respect the rules of civil-  
ized warfare. Gutierrez has insisted  
that he has ordered all summary exe-  
cutions stopped. But unofficial re-  
ports indicate that the orders, if ex-  
ecuted, have not been received. At  
least 2000 white pine trees. At the
