The money Miss Minard expected to spend on gowns for her debut will be contributed to the Red Cross fund. The Peace Pageant will open the Home Exposition, at which recently invented labor-saving devices for the home will be displayed.

FARMERS' UNION TO SEEK AID OF U. S.

Crop Moving Problem Chief Subject At Big Conference in Fort Worth.

FORT WORTH, TEX., Sept. 2.—When the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of America resumed its sessions here today the crop moving problem was the matter considered.

A long discussion was expected because of the importance of the question. Business sessions of the convention was cleared up at last night's session. Reports of officers of the union were made and the first of a series of speeches giving various views on the cotton congestion was heard.

That the aid of the Federal government will be sought to bring about a solution of the crop difficulty was indicated from the addresses at yesterday's sessions.

There are fully 2,000 delegates attending the convention, representing every state from Florida to Washington.

KILLS TO SAVE HIS LIFE. (Special to The States.) COLUMBUS, MISS., Sept. 2.—To protect his own life, John Harris, a wealthy farmer of the Stearns neighborhood, and brother of Deputy Sheriff Joe Harris, shot and killed Harry Dozier, negro, Mr. Harris gave himself up to Sheriff Bell, and was placed under \$500 bond.

Year Sardinia the negro asked for a drink of water, and as the deputy rose to get it, he struck him in the face, then turning, he quickly dove head first through the car window. Sardinia grabbed the negro by the foot and held him until the train was stopped. Sardinia fought until exhausted, and when he reached Jackson was suffering from internal and other injuries. DEADLOCK CONTINUES ON GEORGIA SENATOR. Hardwick Leading; Governor Slaton Close Second.

MACON, GA., Sept. 2.—After a stormy session of seventeen hours, the Georgia Democratic Convention here recessed at 7 o'clock this morning with the deadlock on the choice for nomination to the short term as United States senator still unbroken. The vote at the end of the thirteenth ballot stood:

Congressman T. W. Hardwick, 164; Gov. John M. Slaton, 110; T. S. Felder, 93; and G. H. Hutcheson, 4. Just 188 votes are necessary for nomination. The convention was to resume balloting at noon today.
