FOR THE HOT-WATER BOTTLE

Pretty Cover That is Practical and Will Also Serve to Amuse the Small Child.

A cunning cover for the miniature hotwater bottle, which is called into requisition for children's toilet articles and colics, is made of canvas flannel. A small proof-press of marcelled cotton is crinkled around the edge and the opening, which is drawn up over the neck of the bottle with a narrow tape. On one side of the flat cover is embossed, in blue outline, the image of a pleasant baby, and, whose silhouette, as she sits smiling over her whippers, just fills the shaped cover of the bottle. The reverse side of the canvas flannel bag is embossed to resemble the back of the same baby. The bag, besides retaining the heat and giving a more comfortable sensation when in contact with tender skin than the rubber bottle, will distract the mind of a young invalid from her ill and insure a more speedy convalescence.

Prone Practice Tonight. It is expected that there will be a good attendance of the prone shooters at the range tonight to take part in the first preliminary practice for the coming league shooting and an endeavor will be made to find out how the men can hold up in shooting 20-shot strings instead of the usual 10 shots in club work. Instead of the five bullet target referred to in this paper last night as being the target to be used in this practice, Secretary Gilman states that the regulation six bullet target will be used, as he has received a supply of these targets from the Huntington, N. C. Co., for just such practice work. These are far more desirable, as they are not only the same as will be used in league matches, but the five bullet eye targets have a black center only one and one-half inches in diameter, which is a feature the club has tried to avoid this year so that there may be no change necessary in sighting range in Colorado.

Telling the average list at the close of the recent prone series it would seem as though four men were entitled to a place on the team in the first league match. These are Eadsden, Broadhead, L.
