Removal Of Thyroid Keeps Tadpole From Ever Becoming Frog

Cleveland, Aug. 8.—Removal of the thyroid gland from a tadpole will prevent the animal from developing into a frog, according to Dr. Bennett Allen, professor of zoology at the University of California, who made the statement here after 12 years' experimenting with tadpoles.

The tadpoles will continue to grow but they will develop only to the stage where the hind legs begin to sprout. They will never change into a frog.

KNN in the Movies

Station KNN, at Los Angeles, has entered the movies. The Paramount studios at Hollywood will house its new 5,000-watt transmitter and hereafter programs will be under Paramount auspices as well as those of its former owners. The station has received permission to install a 500,000-watt outfit for future use.

First On Low Power

KDKA, Pittsburgh, the pioneer station of the country, first went on the air back in 1920 with a power of 100 watts. Today it broadcasts up to 50,000 watts.

"Stand By" No More

"Please stand by" has been dropped from the lexicon of KOA at Denver. It is misapplied, says the KOA director. Now the intermission is punctuated by "Such-and-such program will follow."

Stations Are Pets

Those engaged at WLW and WSAI, Cincinnati, find it easier to refer to each by pet names, such as "Lew" and "Sl," rather than the lengthier call letters. Other stations have shortened their call letters to names.

Chance for Songsters
There's a new opportunity for song writers who are turned down by publishers. They might try the radio studios. Leland Yost, a New York musician, did so recently and got his piece accepted by the NBC for radio presentation, after the publishers had refused it.
