

FEUD GUN ENDS REVENGE VOW OF HUSBAND

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP).—Two 20-year-old boys were to avenge the definite death of his wife when she was murdered, a feud gun and his rage has begun.

The violent death of Tracy's wife through explosion of a bomb concealed in her automobile was no more sudden than Tracy's own. A shotgun pointed against his back; she slipped in his body, and Tracy Domingo, 21, one time "baby shooter" on a little Michigan farm, was dead on the floor of a north side cafe.

Other shots in the Ogden avenue cafe dropped to the floor or through shutter under tables. Ralph Bernhart, Domingo's dining companion, held position he hardly had time to slip to his feet when the killer dashed out of the place.

Domingo was unable to connect Domingo with any Chicago gang activities, but a newspaper man revealed how Mrs. Tracy Domingo had died in St. Joseph, Mich., in 1927, and his story today started officers on a new line of investigation.

QUIZ TO DECIDE WATER POLICY

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 29 (AP).—But until crops have been checked and water surveyed throughout more than half the state's area will the Department of Public Works announce its policy for carrying out California's co-ordinated water program.

More than 4,000,000 acres south of Fresno have been surveyed as to irrigability and the survey now is being prosecuted in northern San Joaquin Valley, check of 800 wells in that valley shows a falling water table indicates a rapidly decreasing supply of being made and similar service is to be performed in Sacramento Valley, the department reveals.

Salinity in the lower Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, and a menace to North Bay industrial water supplies, is being studied.

MYSTERY CAVE DISCOVERED BY PAIR IN DEATH VALLEY

STOVE PIPE WELLS, Death Valley, Aug. 29 (AP).—Death Valley has given up another of its secrets. The report of Bill Corcoran and Jack Stewart, who reported today that they had found a mystery cave in the Sheep Mountains.

This cave is mentioned in both the ghostly and Pute Indian legends. It is of fabulous proportions, taking several hours to traverse.

Its walls are covered with Indian writings, and the passageway is filled with what are supposed to be human bones.

Corcoran and Stewart obtained the entrance which led to their discovery of the cave from Fanneston George, a Shoshone Indian.

They found piles of beautifully carved pottery and several piles of bones. There was strong draught inside, and they could hear the rattle of hidden water.

Five hundred feet from the entrance they came upon a cavern which blocked further investigation.

BAY JAIL BREAK PLOT THWARTED

Additional measures to prevent the escape of Lloyd W. Stangeli and Brian A. McKeon, East Bay bank bandit suspects, were planned today as their retrial continued in the court of Superior Judge Frank V. Wood.

During a 10½ hours session, Stangeli and his wife Logan, prosecutor, J. Edgar Wilson, called in testimony. The witness was believed to have been a rehearsal for a transfer of Stangeli.
