

Tropical Park Handicap Won By Huskie Boy

Outsider Defeats Knowing by Five Lengths at 5 1/2 Furlongs, Pays \$16.30; McCombs Rides a Triple

CORAL GABLES, Fla., March 17 (P)—W. C. Stroube's Huskie Boy, the only three-year-old in the field and longest priced of the five starters, romped to victory in the St. Patrick's Handicap before a good-sized crowd this afternoon. The Black Dot colt, paying \$8.30, started at 10-1 and won the five and a half furlongs in 1:08:1.5. The track was fast, despite light morning showers.

Kenneth McCombs was astir the winner for his second score on a program which the valiant seven-year-old named after the patron saint of Ireland. Hunch players collected both times for McCombs was the only jockey performing with an "Me" in his name.

McCombs rounded out a riding triple when he guided Starwick home by three lengths at odds of \$17.20 for \$2 in the closing contest.

Knowing's Second

Lonschamps Farms' Knowing, a galloping winner of his last and favorite in the small field, took second money behind Huskie Boy by a nose. He had won from the Van Winkle's Gene Wagers. Lady Higlass was fourth and Double B. last.

Gene Wagers had the best of the start. He broke in advance of the others from the outside position, but Huskie Boy, which had stopped in the race, recent ran won. Bigey had the lead to the seven furlongs on the rail and take a daylight lead in the first furlong. The surprise horse kept increasing his lead and had nothing to fear in the stretch run. Knowing saved ground and was hard ridden while overtaking and Double B. were badly outrun.

A. G. Tarn's Wise Fox, a 2-to-1 favorite, raced to his second straight triumph in the third event of a mile and sixty yards. Well ridden by Johnny Longden, the three-year-old gelding, who was restrained behind the early pace of Birdie and Petit Four, Longden urged the colt leaving the far side and his mount bounded to the front, opened up a comfortable lead and registered by two lengths. Becky Bates was a fast closing second, three lengths clear of Birdie.

Jack Patches Pays \$38.90

An upset occurred with the running of the mile and a sixteen-sixth race. Jack Patches, a \$38.90 for \$2 proposition, scored by a length and a half, giving the Cosgrave Stable a double. Stocks and the Winkles' four-some were the other four to share the second money.

Porter Roberts broke Jack Patches in front and the combination never was beaten. Buttermilk and then Terpsichore tried to keep up with the gelding. Neither was equal to the task, nor was Stocks with his stretch bid.

Taut, recently claimed by the Cosgrave Stable for \$1,500, carried his new silks to victory in the opening event for two-year-old maidens. With McCombs replacing George Seabas as his saddlemaster, Taut held his own against the more experienced Lawyer, which returned \$7.90 for place. Darby Dean, the choice, was a belated third, a head behind. Taut ran down the fast starting Glibor and was powerfully ridden to maintain a slight advantage to the wire. He returned at 20 to 1.

Oaklawn Double Pays \$6,002.80 on \$2 Play

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., March 17 (P)—The second highest daily double ever of American racing history was returned at Oaklawn Park today when Deputy Sheriff Charles McNutt, of Little Rock, collected \$6,002.80 for \$2 after Peggy Torch had won the first race and Miss Firedy had accounted for the second.

The Sheriff was the only one that coupled the two longshots.

Peggy Torch paid \$157.70 for \$2 in the pari-mutuels, while Miss Firedy returned \$88.80.

The American record was set at Tropical Park in 1935 when Harry Tosepy, of Jersey City, received \$7,205.40 for a \$2 investment.

McNutt also had \$10 on Miss Firedy to win and collected \$444 more.
