

Week-end Traffic Takes 24 Lives In Northern Calif.

Twenty-four persons died in northern California week-end traffic accidents.

Sid Borbor, 26, of Teheran, Iran, an aeronautical student at California State Polytechnic College, died early today in a head-on collision on U. S. Highway 101 north of Paso Robles.

Gilbert Moisa of Isleton was fatally injured in a head-on collision nine miles north of Antioch on Highway 24.

Injured in the same crash were Moisa's passenger, Warner Abressey of Stockton, Manuel Serpa, 59, of Rio Vista, driver of the other car, and the latter's wife, Mabel. The Serpas are in Lodi Memorial Hospital while Abressey is in Contra Costa Hospital.

Ten others were killed in the early part of the week-end.

Oscar Lewis, 29, of Turlock, passenger on a motorcycle driven by Howard McClelland, 40, of Fresno, was killed yesterday in a collision with a truck 12 miles south-east of Modesto.

Two men were killed last night in separate accidents on the Pacheco Pass. The victims were Anthony Frank Real Jr., 26, of Los Banos, and Harry Manly, 76, of Dos Palos.

Real's car left the highway on a curve 10 miles west of Los Banos and crashed into a telephone pole.

Ray died when his car collided with one driven by Melvin B. Daughtry, 20, of Fresno.

CHILD INJURED

Two-year-old Dorothy Whitman suffered cuts and bruises of the back, legs and face yesterday when she ran into the path of a car driven by Henry T. Grimes, 58, 446 Orient street, at Geneva avenue and Orient street.

Grimes was not cited. The child, whose home is at 1716 Sunnydale avenue, was taken to Children's Hospital.

MARIN MISHAP

Most spectacular week-end accident was a three-car crash near Coyote yesterday in which ten persons were injured. Cars driven by Neiland G. Doughty, 19, of San Jose and Morris G. Young, 35, of Dos Palos collided on U. S. Highway 101, then the Doughty car careened into one driven by Ralph G. Carlson of Cupertino.

Treated for cuts and

bruises at O'Connor Hospital in San Jose were Young, his wife, Edwina, 31; their children, Karen, 2, and Nancy, 8 months; Doughty and his wife, Louise, 19; Carlson, his wife and two children, Warren, 15, and Dale, 17. Mrs. Doughty also suffered a broken left leg.

In Marin County, two children escaped serious injuries when a car driven by their mother went over an embankment at Stinson Beach Road near Panoramic Highway.

Mrs. Rhea Budd, 29, 40 Forest avenue, Mill Valley, told police she was trying to pass a slower car and slipped off a shoulder of the road. The children were treated for minor cuts and bruises at Ross Hospital. Their mother was not injured.

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REDS TO GET BRITISH RUBBER

LONDON, June 4 (AP).—Britain has authorized her colonies to consider applications for the sale of some strategic goods, including rubber, to Communist China. The Western nations imposed a ban on the export of what they consider war potential goods, including rubber, to Red China after the Peiping regime was branded an aggressor by the United Nations.

NEW POLICY

A foreign office spokesman said the authorization has been given within the framework of what he said

was Britain's "new policy," announced May 14. Britain intends to make wider use of the "exceptions procedure" in the export ban.

DECLINES REPLY

This escape clause permits any Western ally to send strategic goods to the Mao Tze-tung regime, so long as the exporting nation tells its partners what it is doing.

The foreign office spokesman said the governments of Malaya and Singapore now are free to consider applications for the export of rubber to the Chinese Communists in what he called reasonable quantities. He declined to reply when asked if any maximum has been laid down.

The British also have been

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selling about 7,000 tons of rubber to the Soviet Union each year.

Singapore and Malaya have been pressing Britain to ease the control on rubber sales. Raw rubber prices on world markets have started to fall.

In anticipation of the British action, the downward trend of prices was halted over the week-end.

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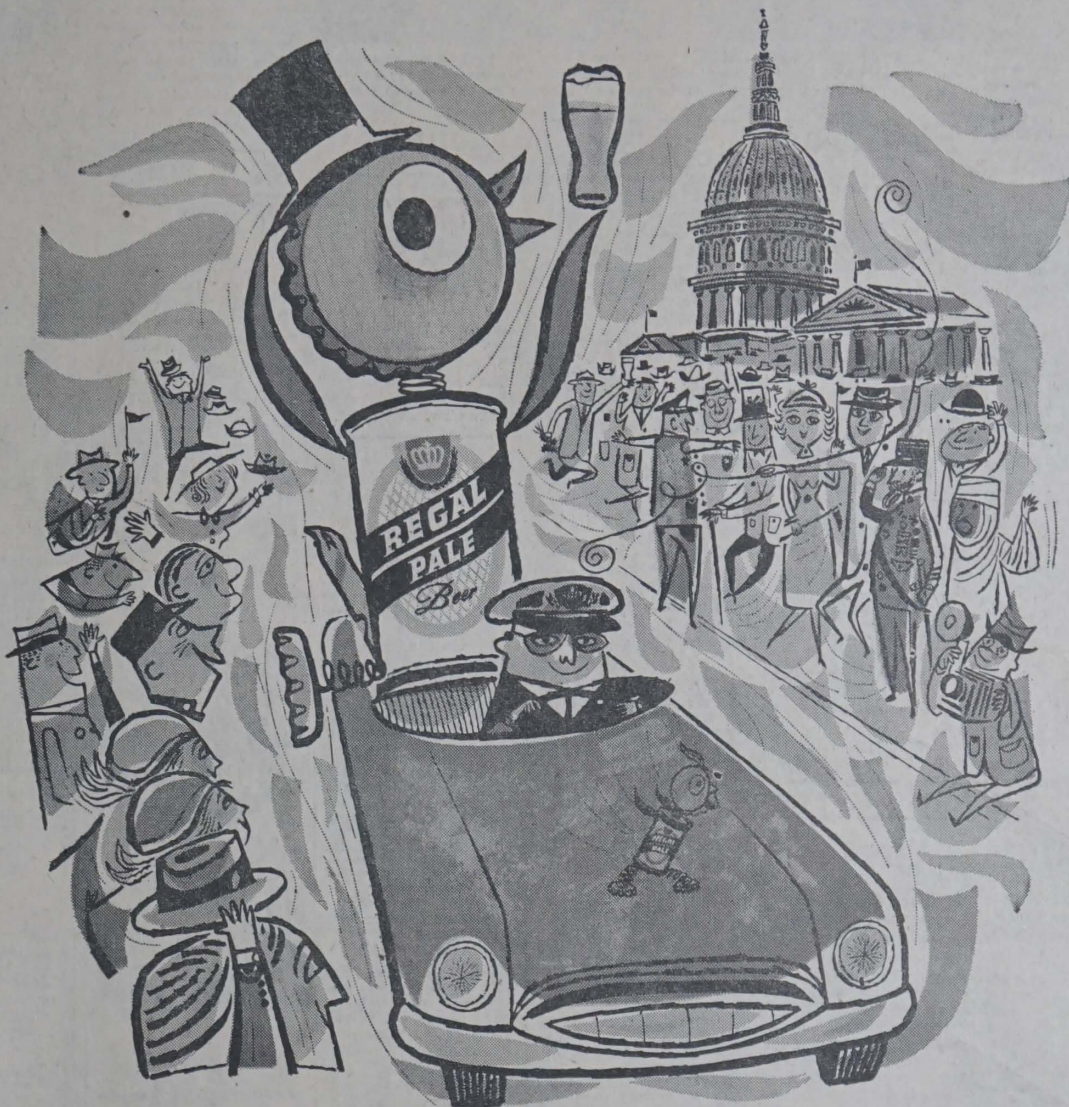
