Dr. Albert Hartzell, one of the founding staff of the Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research, Inc. has retired. He has been an entomologist and consultant at the institute for 37 years.

A garden party was given for him and his wife at the home of Dr. and Mrs. George L. McNew of 703 S. Broadway, Hastings-on-Hudson. Dr. McNew, director of the institute, spoke on Dr. Hartzell's scientific and civic achievements.

Dr. Hartzell was a delegate last year to the 11th International Congress of Entomology in Vienna, where he read a paper on insect Tissue Culture. At the present time is chairman of the Yonkers Shade Tree Commission.

Staff members presented Dr. and Mrs. Hartzell a slide projector and a screen. Among the guests were Dr. Donald Collins, state entomologist from Albany and Dr. and Mrs. J. L. Horsfall. Dr. Horsfall is consultant of the Geigy Chemical Co. in Ardsley. In addition several letters were read from out-of-town entomologists.

Dr. Hartzell is the last active member of the founding staff of Boyce Thompson Institute, which was started by Colonel William Boyce Thompson 37 years ago. He graduated from Columbia

Moczydlowski Says His Vote Helped 10th

Councilman Alonzo Moczydlowski of the 10th Ward, Democratic candidate for mayor, claimed credit for improvements in the 10th Ward at a meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Barone, 131 Stone Ave.

The candidate said that while he had never run for office in the 10th Ward he felt he "could also take credit for any accomplishments the Republican councilman of that ward would claim as his own," since he (Moczydlowski) is a member of the Common Council and had voted for improvements.

City Manager Charles L. Curran, candidate for city judge, and Eli S. Cahn and Nasareth Magarian, candidates for justice of the peace, also spoke.

Picone Calls His Opponent A Bit Belated

Speaking to members of the 8th Ward Republican County Committee, Councilman Anthony J. Picone, Republican candidate for that office, commented on what he termed his Democratic opponent's "somewhat belated interest" in housing for older persons in Yonkers.

Referring to a news item in this newspaper reporting a speech by Theodore M. Ruzow, Councilman Picone remarked that his opponent "doesn't even know the number of housing units (for senior citizens) under construction in the 8th Ward." The Western Avenue project of the Municipal Housing Authority contains 108 units, he said, and not "about 125" as stated by Mr. Ruzow. Mr. Picone pointed out that the Housing Authority also accommodates some older citizens in its Mallard Gardens and other projects.

Mr. Curran for 42 non-frank Campaign headquarters at 45 S. Broadway have been opened by the committee for election of City Manager Charles L. Curran as city judge. There'll be a committee meeting tonight and headquarters will be open daily from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. Harold Broderick and Mrs. Margaret Reid are committee co-chairmen.

6 Violations Denied By Liquor Dealer

Murray Kaye of 7 Old Jerome Ave., a retail liquor dealer in White Plains has denied six alleged violations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Law.

The State Liquor Authority in Manhattan accuses him of violating the law at his retail store at 92 Westchester Ave., White Plains. Kaye, it was charged, sold liquor at prices less than those authorized by the authority, sold on credit and sold more than 35 gallons to a person on one occasion.

In addition, the authority charged, he failed to keep adequate books and records, allowed a person identified as Phillip Kaye to benefit illegally from his license, and accepted orders for the sale of liquor at the business place of a consumer.

The authority accepted his denial and will hold a hearing on the charges.
